And yet, if air is pumped into us, we become a whole new being. Like Holy Spirit air! This air gives us the privilege, the choice, and the energy to share Jesus to the world. Are you a balloon? Let's toss those inflated balloons for our Jesus. Pentecost time!

And from this point, let us continue with an update on the farm and this ministry over these past weeks. Being almost to the end of May, we here are in the hot humid, steamy most days, season time. Folks go about their days as best possible. They are already eagerly preparing for the rainy season, as that's the time of planting, of nurturing the ground to give them a healthy crop of rice for another year, to provide feed for their animals, food for themselves, and maybe earn an income.

It takes time to build a farm from the ground up (no pun intended). But that is about how it is going these days. A common phrase off times that one may hear is 'one by one.' It just means here that it is one brick, then another, one bag of cement used, then another. Almost all of this land preparation project is done by hand, by so many hands. And it takes 'time' to get things to completion.

I dream of the day when I can look out and see the morning glory growing(edible), the little eggplants, the cucumbers, the duckweed, fruit trees, the pigs, the chickens, maybe fish, or ducks all out there doing their own thing. It is all going to take time. In 5-8 years to see the hard work and the fruits of all of that labor. The garden will be green, full, and happy. The animals will be content. It will all take time.

As of this newsletter, there has been one completed sanitation project that included a double walled dual holding tanks plus a room housing a fresh water holding tank and toilet. Nearby, outside, is a working well as a water source.




