Hillcrest School in Jos, Nigeria

On July 22, 1942, teacher, Mary Dadison, welcomed 12 pupils to begin Hillcrest School, a new venture of the Church of the Brethren Mission.



There was a school room, a teacher, pupils, foster parents, food and even a bed,but no te xt books! The order had been placed early, but the books were lost at sea because of the war (World War II). A second order was placed. When it didn't arrive, a tracer brought a report: ship sunk. Then in May 1943, 80 different packages arrived. School was dismissed and

all the children went with the staff to the post office to bringthe first text books to Hillcrest. Books had never been more welcomed by either pupils or teachers!

In 1946, the school moved to the current location. From the beginning, Hillcrest accepted pupils without regard to race or color. On March 29, 1947, "The Nigerian Daily Times", Lagos, carried an article "No Color Bar in BrethrenMission School." Other missions quickly developed an interest in Hillcrest. So, in 1955

the Sudan United Mission, Assemblies of God Mission and the United Missionary Society j oined CBM's efforts. These original four grew to include **the Missouri Synod Lutheran Mission (1963)**, the American Lutheran Mission (1964), the Nigerian Baptist Mission (1967), Mambilla Baptist Mission (1967), Sudan Interior Mission (1968), the Great Commission Movement(1982), and later both the United Methodist and the Wycliffe Bible Translators.

Hillcrest began as an elementary school, and high school classes were taken by correspondence until 1964. 1965


saw the first high school graduating class made up of eight students. The school has continued to expand by adding classes, varsity sports and a variety of extracurricular activities. Student body populations have included students from many corners of the world, sometimes with as many as 34 different nations being represented on the campus at one time. Hillcrest School's vision is based on our Christian missionary roots and to be strategically used by God as a quality international

Christian school, educating global Disciples of Christ in all facets of society, and increasingly living out our Core Values. Great is God's faithfulness!

Valparaiso, Chile

Theological Educators for South Sudan

The Evangelical Lutheran Church of South Sudan is seeking professors to teach at their seminary in Yambio. Courses could include such subjects as Dogmatics, Church Administration, Stewardship, Romans, Theology of Missions, Pastoral Counseling, The Gospel of John, and Christian Apologetics.

How do I become a missionary teacher / educator?

Global Lutheran Outreach works in partnership with cooperating institutions. This means that sending a missionary is a cooperative effort! The school or church that receives a missionary puts some "skin in the game", lowering the cost for the missionary. In most cases mentioned above, the school will provide housing for the missionary.

Under the coaching of GLO, the missionary then develops a network of "mission partners" who provide support: emotional, spiritual, prayer, and finances.

GLO missionaries typically make a minimum 2-year commitment to serve in-country. In the case of South Sudan, professors may serve for a semester rather than a full 2-year term.
